From Rebuilding Ireland to Housing for All

International and Irish lessons for tackling homelessness

COPE Galway was one of six housing and homelessness organisations that commissioned and contributed to a new report reviewing Ireland's homeless strategies.

The report, launched last September, was authored by researchers from Ireland, Portugal, the UK and the USA who reviewed Ireland's 2016 Housing and Homelessness Action Plan and spoke to stakeholders who deliver homeless services as well as people who have experienced homelessness.

Since 2016 'Rebuilding Ireland' was central to Ireland's homeless crisis response until it was replaced with the Housing for All plan in 2021. Today homelessness is at an all time high.

Drawing on lessons from international practice, the report recommends considerations for homeless strategies, including a broader definition of homelessness in order to respond to the true nature of the homeless crisis.




## 970 Stationery Packs Delivered to Families

Last September our Community Catering team distributed over 970 stationery packs to families across Galway. The packs which include copy books, pens, pencils and other necessary school items are provided by the EU FEAD programme.

As a local FEAD partner, COPE Galway delivers these stationery packs to children supported through our own Family Services and Modh Eile House, as well as to families supported by Loughrea and Gort Family Resource Centres; No 4 Youth Service and Tusla services in Galway City, Athenry, Ballinasloe, Oughterard, Tuam and Loughrea.

## **Report Paints Stark Picture** for Women and Girls

A Garda crime trends report published in September found that domestic violence was a factor in the majority of murders and unlawful killings of women and girls in 2021.

It is deeply depressing to learn from the report that most women and girls who were murdered or unlawfully killed met their deaths at the hands of someone, usually male, who they knew and within a domestic violence setting.


The report gives an insight to the level of violence victims of domestic abuse are suffering and the ongoing need for available supports.

Our domestic abuse service saw a marked increase in the number of women calling our service in 2021, with a 48% increase over 2020 in women accessing our 24-hour refuge and a 40% increase in women using our outreach supports.

**Under Operation Faoiseamh local** Gardaí provide vital call back support to victims of domestic violence, ensuring women know they are believed and supported.

However, we fear the headlines from the publication of the report will be all too quickly forgotten and the pervasive nature of domestic violence will continue to damage the lives of women and children

There is a need for further and more wide-ranging research into domestic abuse. The new statutory Domestic, Sexual And Gender-Based Violence (DSGBV) Agency, which will lead consistent and ongoing research to inform DSGBV policy development, cannot start a day too soon.

# New art installation to allow people to pause and reflect on major societal issue - violence against women

Our Domestic Abuse Service in partnership with ATU Galway School of Design and Creative Arts commissioned an art project, supported by Medtronic, to mark 40 years of service which will give people in Galway an opportunity to pause and reflect on a grave societal issue - violence against women.

The theme of the art project was selected following conversations with staff and clients of the service, who were asked to consider what they thought the artwork should portray.


Both positive and negative words were repeated - words like silence, isolation, fear and humiliation, as well as words such as strength, hope, love, pride and resilience.

COPE Galway has operated a domestic abuse service for over 40 years, and we have done so with the generous support of our community. Together with our community, we can make Galway a safer place for women and girls. This art installation will contribute to this.

The completed artwork, by Maura Finnegan, a graduate of ATU Galway's MA in Creative Art Practice, will be available to view at various locations in Galway City and County from November 25th (International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) until the end of February 2023.





COPE Galway Osterley Lodge is a 24-hour emergency accommodation service for single adult women who are homeless.

The service first opened in Ashley House, a B&B on Bishop O'Donnell Road in October 2022, before moving to its current location at Osterley Lodge in December 2003.

As with all services, there have been challenges along the way, according to Elaine Power, Service Manager and Paula Nolan, Project Worker, who have both been with the service since it was set up.

However with hard work and the right approach they are really proud of what Osterley Lodge has achieved since 2003. "The flexibility and resilience of the Osterley Lodge staff over the years has kept the service going and shaped it into what it is today" says Elaine.

Lisa Silke, who worked in Osterley Lodge back in 2002 and is now Homeless Services' Quality and Best Practice Manager, said: "A lot has changed. I remember on Wednesday afternoons going to the kiosk in Eyre Square to get the property listings in the Advertiser to photocopy for the rest of the staff." "We've gotten a lot more innovative around how we work with people," Paula says, reflecting on how Osterley Lodge has progressed.

There has been a significant rise in demand for the service in recent years, and today, due to the homeless crisis, the service is nearly always at full occupancy and moving on is taking longer than in the earlier years.

#### **Age Proofing Your Life**

De-stressing, a Mediterranean diet and good company are some of the ways you can improve your ageing journey, according to Professor Rose Anne Kenny, author of the international best-seller Age Proof: The new science of living a longer and healthier life.

Speaking at a Positive Ageing Week event jointly hosted by COPE Galway and the University of Galway Irish Centre for Social Gerontology, Professor Kenny explained that genes contribute to 20-30% of lifespan and the rest is environmental factors.

"We can actually modify our lifespan. It's all in our own control. Just in case anyone's thinking it's too late for me - it's never too late. But the younger we start the better."

Professor Kenny also said good relationships are incredibly important, describing friendships as an anti-oxidant to stress, one of the factors that accelerates biological ageing. Research, she says, clearly shows that a Mediterranean diet (fruit, vegetables, olive oil, fish, whole grains, nuts) leads to longer, healthier lives.

## **Meet Karen Fitzgerald**

Community Support Worker, Senior Support Service

I joined COPE Galway in May 2022. I was doing a Masters in Ageing and Public Policy at the time when my lecturer asked me where I wanted to go with my degree.

I didn't really know what was out there but I knew I wanted to work with older people or in something related to services for older people.

My lecturer put me in contact with Jacquie (Head of COPE Galway Senior Support Service) who met with me and talked me through what the service does. We just got on really well and the work resonated with me.

I had to do a placement to complete my dissertation and I did it with the service. Later a job came up and I interviewed for the role and got it.

I am lucky to work with a great team, who are very supportive. I can ask them anything, check ideas with them, and I also get to work on my own initiative. It is a busy role.

One of the things I love most about the role is interacting with older people. I am very fortunate to have quite active and driven older people in my life. I was really close to my grandmother and a few other older ladies.

I also worked in disability services and I have seen people when they are struggling. I wanted to combine that, to make some part of someone's day a bit easier, or even a bit fun.

Could be simple things like helping someone fill out a form or helping with getting stuff done in their home.

My role really does change each day. Some days I can be working on simple things like helping someone fill out a form or getting a job done in their home. I might be playing bingo, organising group classes or social activities. On other days I am working on presentations or grant applications.

It can be challenging, but I want to make a difference in people's lives so I find it very rewarding too.
