For the third year in a row, COPE Galway's Helping Kids First programme has been selected to receive funding from the RTÉ Toy Show Appeal (2022 Toy Show). Helping Kids First supports children living in emergency accommodation by addressing social exclusion, improving living conditions and providing vital education and social development support to children, teenagers and their parents.

In 2022, the project supported 111 children by delivering 37 homework clubs, enabling attendance at summer camps and working with families to help them access services and supports in the community.

Solas Óg 'Fairy Housing Estate'

There has been a wonderful addition to Solas Óg with the creation of a new 'Fairy Housing Estate' in the garden of Modh Eile House. Maarit and Lorraine from the Solas Óg team wanted to create something magical that children who were staying in the refuge, and those coming to Solas Óg during the day, could enjoy.

They initially planned to create a fairy garden and invited the children staying in the refuge at the time to build it with them. When they started working on it, the children decided it should be a fairy housing estate instead, so this is what they built. It is a delightful addition to the garden at Modh Eile House which the children have made their own - unless it is raining they will be there every day!







Taking part in the national period poverty pilot



Period poverty is a major issue in Ireland, with people who menstruate struggling to afford the cost of products. Thanks to funding from the Department of Health Period Poverty Pilot Project, we are able provide accessible products for those who need them. Osterley Lodge manager, Elaine Power, said they do everything they can to minimise any stigma, and encourage and promote self-care and hygiene associated with period poverty by providing free products.

She hopes to establish a system in which each COPE Galway service has a nominated team member who will communicate the products that clients need. Elaine aspires to establish subscription-based programmes and confidential deliveries of period products across COPE Galway services.



Taking on challenges at Wildlands

In July, staff and clients of COPE Galway's Resettlement Service embarked on a fun day out to Wildlands Activity Centre, Moycullen. Ben Igoe and Mags Coleman took Bridge House residents through a Zip 'n' Trek challenge, taking on an obstacle course 15 metres above the ground. Both staff and residents navigated through 40 variations of rope, bridge and swing obstacles and some adrenaline-inducing zip lines, with determination and courage! The group enjoyed a welldeserved treat after completing the course.

The trip to Wildlands was inspired by Men's Health Week. The day out was an opportunity for the men to take on an enjoyable physical and mental challenge and also spend some social time out and about in nature.

Activities like these are a great way to escape, for a short while, the dayto-day challenges of experiencing homelessness. The Wildlands experience gave clients a great sense of accomplishment, reminding them of their ability to overcome challenges. These experiences also help build confidence, and communication and teamwork skills.

What's in a name?

How we refer to people in older age matters. Words have power. Words influence how we think and feel. Words influence how we age.


We conducted a survey asking older people how they prefer to be referred to, and to guide us on what we call our services for older people.


From 198 responses, most preferred 'Seniors' as a term to be used when referring to older people. The clear winner for what we should call COPE Galway services for people in older age was Senior Support Service - the name we are currently using.

The majority of respondents were in the age range 61-70, followed almost evenly by 71-80 (41) and below 50 (40). 32 of the respondents were 51-60 and 7 were over 80 years.

In the comments, the term "Senior" was referred to as conveying the positive experience that the older person can contribute to our world and helps defeat ageism. One said:

66 I think Senior is a more defined term, and maybe holds more clout in society, like a rank or position."

New 'City of Tribes' mural unveiled by residents of Fairgreen Hostel

Residents of Fairgreen Hostel teamed up with local artist, Tracey Moca, last July to create the 'City of Tribes' mural.

The mural, which celebrates all things Galway, has transformed the side of the hostel building facing Fairgreen Road.

The project was a collaborative effort led by the artist. Tracey consulted with the residents of Fairgreen Hostel to put together the mural design.

Tracey worked on the project with residents and within two weeks they had created an incredible piece of visual art they are all deeply proud of. "The Fairgreen Hostel residents have created a wonderful tribute to Galway," Tracey said. "Their commitment and engagement with the project has been fantastic. Thanks to the guys for all their kindness, hard work and generosity on this, and for giving the Galway community such a beautiful gift!"

Paudie Cunningham, Fairgreen Team Leader, said the project gave residents a real sense of purpose and ownership of their space, and encouraged some to think about pursuing a career in either painting or art.

We are thrilled the team is getting so much positive feedback and appreciation from the community.

The project was funded by Galway City Council and Creative Ireland, and supported by T. O'Higgins Homevalue who donated paints and other materials.

Elaine Biggins is Team Leader at Solas Óg, COPE Galway's children and young people's domestic abuse service.

She has worked with COPE Galway since 2016, but her sights were set on working for the organisation long before then.

"Going through school and college I always felt that COPE Galway was an organisation that stood out to me."

Being naturally empathetic, having a want to help others and to work with younger people, Elaine studied social care in Limerick, but was not sure what area she wanted to branch into

It was her college work placement with the Garda Youth Diversion Project in Moyross in Limerick that lead her to working with COPE Galway.

"When I did that [placement] I knew that was the route I wanted to go down. I wanted to work with young people from disadvantaged areas, that had difficult upbringings".

As a Team Leader in Solas Óg, Elaine does not have a "typical day". Although there are standard practices for staff within the service. like morning hand overs and opening the in-house playroom for morning and evening sessions with children, each day is different. This variety is one of the things Elaine loves about working with

COPE Galway.

"I love the idea of coming in and not really knowing how the day is going to pan out. It keeps us on our toes."

Not only is there variety in her work, the diversity within Elaine's team and among the people they support is something she finds very beneficial for continual learning and challenge. Within the Solas Og team, backgrounds range from play therapists and family support workers, to people who have worked in childcare and studied neuroscience.

"When all that comes together you learn so much from each other. I just feel like I'm constantly learning."

Reflecting on her time with COPE Galway to date, Elaine's advice for anyone looking for a role with COPE Galway is to "go for it":

"Go for the position if you think you want it and see how you get on. If you get the post, don't be afraid to ask questions or come to other team members for support if you need it - because that is what we are all there for."



Long-established local Galway business, T. O'Higgins Homevalue Hardware, recently held a fundraising event with a unique twist in aid of COPE Galway.

Taking inspiration from "I'm a Celebrity...Get Me Out of Here!", T. O'Higgins organised their own "I'm Not a Celebrity... But I Can Do It" event, where staff member, Sean Black, volunteered to eat just about anything he was given.

Sean, who works part-time while also studying law, said the idea formed when he jokingly told his co-workers that he could eat anything since he had lost his sense of taste after contracting COVID-19. They then came up with the idea for Sean to eat crazy foods to raise funds for COPE Galway.

They started planning and promoting their event, and set a goal to hold the event within two weeks and to raise €2,000. "We were scared that we weren't going to make the goal in two weeks, but we managed to do it



in the first week."

On the day, the Black Cat restaurant presented Sean with the dishes, which included sheep's tongue, monkfish eyeball, a fish gut milkshake and live crickets. "Some of them were really bad. That monkfish eye was awful," Sean said.

Sean ate it all and, while he does not plan on doing that again, he said doing it for COPE Galway made it worthwhile.

So far they have raised over €4,000, thanks to the generosity of people in the community.


