He is the full-time family carer for his beloved wife and best friend Bridie, also age 76, who has experienced much illness from a young age. Dan has cared for Bridie for all of their life together since they were 16, but particularly in the past 20 years.

Dan worked previously in the army, then as a taxi driver and later in security, but gave up work to care full-time for Bridie, who wishes to be cared for at home where they reared their five children. Dan has lead a healthy lifestyle throughout his life and completed many marathons. Although he slowed down a bit due to a heart attack and skin cancer a few years ago, it didn't affect him caring for his devoted wife. The caring role is arduous as Bridie needs full assistance with all activities of daily living. Dan is a great cook and prepares all their meals. Despite the challenging nature of his full-time caring role, Dan continues to be positive, jovial and selfless and to have a truly inspirational zest for life. He walks his four legged best friend, his dog Max every day and he has joined the local Family Carers Ireland Carers Support Group, completing certified training courses in heart saver CPR, use of a defibrillator, and in manual handling and people handling.

Dan is an exemplary representative of the over half a million family carers in Ireland currently, who care for a loved one at home, and without Dan and the other family carer's constant care and attention, there is no doubt that the health service would be adversely impacted.











#### Celia Comber

Celia Comber lives on the west side of the city and is retired about 15 years now. She is one of the Local Heroes whose stories are featured in the Positive Ageing Week 2022 Local Heroes Exhibition.

Since she retired, she has joined "For Us Now" (F.U.N.) Ladies Club, with weekly meetings in the Westside Library. Certificates can be seen everywhere and her knowledge is shared with all. Socializing and bringing people together are great skills of Carmel's, lending her cooking skills to the annual street BBQ, baking regularly for a person surviving cancer, along with organizing get togethers to encourage all her friends to get involved and use whatever skills they have. Carmel must have invented networking.

Carmel will never forget where her life started. She continues to be a part of the Mother and Baby Home Team seeking justice for all.



No signs of giving up just yet then!



### **Maggie Woods**

Maggie is currently project officer of Access Together Galway, a Gold Star initiative designed to improve accessibility and services for disabled people across businesses in Galway City.

Removing barriers for disabled people is a cause she is passionate about and, in many ways, has been advocating for all her life. As one of the youngest survivors in Ireland of the thalidomide drug disaster, Maggie has faced a lifetime of adversity and succeeded through hard work and a positive outlook. Maggie worked most of her life with for the Irish Wheelchair Association in Tuam. She was also chairperson of the Irish Thalidomide Association and negotiated with two different governments for people born with disabilities caused by the biggest drug catastrophe in the 1950s and 1960s. In addition, when she was in her 30s, she organised a fundraiser for the Galway Hospice Foundation, flying a small Cessna plane from Galway to Shannon and back and raised €8,000 for the organisation. At age 60, and a grandmother of two, her fight for disabled services is not slowing down.

"I came to Galway about thirty-eight years ago with a weekend bag and never left," she said. "I know the people of Galway will work with me to improve accessibility."











### **Marian Moloney**

She is the Chairperson of Access for All Galway, a network of individuals who have lived experience of disabilities and local agencies, focusing on improving access and rights for people with disabilities. Marian has worked tirelessly for more than two decades to ensure equal access to services in Galway City for persons of all ages in order to progress an accessible and disability friendly city for all based on equality and diversity.

Marian accepted the Community Service & Social Inclusion (Group) Award on behalf of "Access for All" at the annual Mayors Awards in 2022. She is an experienced influencer and campaigner on causes that are important to her and the wider society including International Day for People with Disabilities, Make Way Day, Galway Childcare Committee, and Galway City Community Network.

Marian regularly attends blind tennis and tandem cycling with the Galway visually impaired activity club and she walks several times a day with her guide dog, Leon.


She champions issues for older people with disabilities including access to Personal Assistants and Age and Disability Friendly housing, the built environment and public realm.

He loves life, his motto is "No matter what the weather is, every day is a good day", and he lives life to the full.







### **Nora Murphy**

Nora Murphy lives in Ardrahan, Co. Galway and is 71 years young. Nora is the full-time carer for her beloved husband and best friend Tom, also age 71, who experienced a stroke when he was just 48 years of age. At that time, Nora and Tom had two young adult children attending college, and family life and financial circumstances changed considerably, as Tom could no longer work and now needed full-time care and attention from Nora. For the past 23 years, Nora has been devoted in her caring for Tom, who requires assistance with all activities of daily living.

Despite the long number of years caring, and the trauma and shock of a change in having to care for her young husband, Nora always welcomes people with a warm engaging smile and good humour. She is truly an inspirational lady who despite such adversity, continues to always have a positive outlook on life. The care and dedication she provides to her beloved Tom is a joy to behold, and Nora's giving nature does not stop there. She was one of the founding members of Galway Head Injury Support Ltd providing support, information and counselling for families of people with brain injury.

Paying tribute to his wife's love and dedication, Tom describes Nora as his "angel", and says he is very grateful and lucky to have Nora caring for him.

Nora shines a light on the over a half a million family carers in Ireland currently caring at home, and Nora like these family carers, care out of love, not duty. Family Carers Ireland. Nora is truly an inspiration to us all.











#### **Nora Ward**

Nora Ward (Nee Stokes ) is a Traveller woman living in Tuam. She was born in 1942 on the side of the road three miles outside Roscommon, in a tent. Nora grew up in very hard times and was the youngest of 13 children.

She married her husband Martin in 1963 and travelled town to town with their tent on a horse and cart. She wore a shawl and begged the houses. In the late 60's plastic came into use, taking trade from many Travellers. Nora and her family moved into a caravan and in the 70's she put her shawl away and told her children that they had to move on. She didn't want her children begging because they were going to go to school.

She has always been a great cook and could make a meal out of anything! In the 90's she went back to education and learned to read and write in Benin's Training Centre, Tuam (Galway Traveller Movement). She then went on to become a Primary Health Worker. With the average life expectancy of Travellers being 70, Nora is delighted to now being enjoying her retirement at the age of 80.











#### **Nuala Nolan**

Nuala Nolan, is a former Galway City Council Councillor from the years 2011-2014, lives in Galway City, and has been retired for the last 10 years. During her working years, she worked in Royal Tara China, and Boston Scientific, and was the chair of the Galway West Constituency Labour Party in 2004 (Labour Galway-West). Her passion to understand more about politics and to up skill and broaden her knowledge led Nuala to complete a diploma in community practice in 2015, and she then went on to get a degree in Public and Social Policy from University of Galway.

Nuala has spent many years travelling around Ireland and other parts of the world. She is an extremely passionate and knowledgeable person and stays very involved in her community by being an active member of various boards. She is on the board of the Mechanics Club, and due to her massive interest in politics she is an active member of the Trade Council, and she is on a Strategic Planning Committee. Her interest in family history drew her to becoming a member of the Western Family History Association.

In her downtime, Nuala is a huge art fan and is part of an art group that meets on a weekly basis. Her love of art inspired her to organise a 1916 commemoration art exhibition in the Connacht Tribune - Galway City Tribune Print Works in 2016, which ran for two weeks. Artist from all over Ireland showcased their art, and Robert Ballagh donated a print for the show.











#### **Sister Maura Stauton**

Originally from Eyrecourt, Co Galway, Sister Maura Staunton has had a fascinating life to date, and she continues to embrace life every day. After completing her leaving certificate, she made the decision to join the Mercy Sisters in Loughrea. She went on to train as a home economics teacher and taught for a number of years in a secondary school. As many of the Sisters were engaged in voluntary work during the early 80's, five Sisters were chosen to go on the missions in South Africa, including Sr Maura. This was the beginning of a new chapter in her life.

The Clonfert Sisters of Mercy Mission was founded in Dundee Diocese South Africa in 1986. For the next 33 years, Sr Maura was active in community life there. She started sewing classes in rural areas, offered spiritual care, engaged in prison work, supported people and their families with AIDS and much more. She speaks of the experience with great passion and wonderful memories. The joyful singing in the churches there is a memory she holds dear.

In 2019 at the age of 75, Sr Maura returned to Ireland. Her love of people and helping in whatever way she can has not slowed down. She is involved in the community in Renmore and Mervue. She made new friends during lockdown walking in Ballyloughane, offers help to vulnerable people in the community, and is always ready to be of assistance to those who need it.

At the age of 78 she is as busy as ever.
